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A NOTE FROM THE CURATORS

When we asked artists Kate Wallace, Christina May Carey, Gabriella D'Costa, Skye Malu Baker and Julien Comer Klein to be part of the exhibition *Making the invisible* we had a sense of a connective tissue through which their practices could be considered individually and collectively. Each work in the exhibition can be understood as a rich thematic exploration that is absent of the specificities of narrative. The title of the project is deliberately loose to generate speculation about what exactly is being made visible.

Disparate in form and material, the works seem grounded in a deep interest in internalised human experiences. Their pictorial content suggests fleeting 'in-between' moments. In this light, experienced and imagined understandings of time, place and reality, are rendered fluid and malleable. The imagery has a psychological quality that articulates an intense fascination with tiny details of thoughts, the observation of which reveals entire realms of fragility, uncertainty, fantasy. Informed by ideas, obsessions, reflections and instinctive responses, each artist's visual vocabulary has been developed to address notions of perception, intuition and consciousness.
